Traditions

Traditions Matter.

Frank Sonnenberg writes

"Traditions represent a critical piece of our culture. They help form the structure and foundation of our families and our society. They remind us that we are part of a history that defines our past, shapes who we are today and who we are likely to become. Once we ignore the meaning of our traditions, we are in danger of damaging the underpinning of our identity."

Traditions guide us every day in everything we do, holidays, family and even Square Dancing. I, for one, am saddened by the tendency of dancers to drift away from Square Dance traditions and I see it everywhere we go to dance.

What ever happened to Square Dance attire? Only twelve years ago when we first started dancing, we were drawn to the beautiful skirts, flowing crinolines, collar dogs, bolos, belt buckles and bows. What ever happened to men wearing long sleeve shirts, door greeters, banner stealing and yellow rocks? We can use all the excuses we like as to the reasons why some of our square dance traditions have faded into obscurity, but the fact remains we are losing our identity, part of the history that reminds us of our past. The tradition of dressing in Square Dance attire contributes a sense of comfort and belonging. Makes us proud to be a part of this wonderful activity we call square dancing. It provides a forum to showcase, to be role models and a portal to celebrate dance. It allows us to showcase the principles of our activity founders and bonds us together as belonging to a unique group. You won't see the Scottish dance without their kilts or proud First Nations people celebrate their culture without being dressed in regalia appropriate to the occasion. Why is it "ok" to mock our activity by dancing in street clothes? Now I look out onto the floor and see short sleeve shirts, sneakers, jeans, slacks and even shorts; same thing I can see if I were standing on the corner of Main and First Streets downtown.

At the last dance we attended, my wife and I were the only dancers in full square dance attire, and we felt alienated, like we didn't belong. We feel that we must utilizes every opportunity available to us to reinforce the values and beliefs that we hold close to our hearts. The alternative to action is to take these values for granted. If we continue to disregard these values, we will open our eyes one day to traditions unrecognizable and the original fabric of our activity will be torn to a point of no return.

Could this be one of the reasons dancers have drifted off into obscurity? Maritime clubs and clubs in the west still dance in traditional square dance clothing. Why have most Ontario dancers chosen to look the other way. We might just as well toss away our square dance clothes and head down to the local community center on a Saturday night to dance!

Our intolerance to these traditional changes in our activity is rooted in our fear that Square Dancing as we knew it will vanish along with the values and identities that are part of its history. Then again, we can't expect others to abandon their values any more than we would forsake our own and we respect that, but, consider that square dancing is losing its identity, the uniqueness of our activity that makes us stand out from the crowd, the feeling of being "special".

I am sure that there are many root causes and consequences to this rapid erosion of square dance traditions and to analyze and study these may or may not have any influence toward saving them. My voice may be trivial and taken as a rant, but at least I have planted a seed in voicing my disapproval of the road this has taken and given you all food for thought.

A Bit Of History - TVDC

Thames Valley Squares was formed in 1996 by our caller, Ed Dolson and his wife Nancy. The goal was to teach Modern Square Dancing to those who wanted to learn. In 1997, our club was registered with SWOSDA.

Ed and Nancy ran the club on their own until 2004, when a small executive, led by Elda Playford, was elected. Elda maintained this position until 2010, when a new and full executive was elected, with 2 year terms.

Ed began in 1996 by teaching Basic square dance moves and then advanced to the higher levels of Mainstream and Plus dancing as the dancers became comfortable and proficient with the moves he had already taught them.

In 2005, a summer picnic was added to the yearly events, and in 2006, a Christmas dinner was added. By then, we were also doing weekly 50-50 draws to help offset costs of sending fruit baskets and memorial donations to those in need.

In 2007, Rita Buckrell began to teach an hour-long round dance lesson each Monday to those who were interested. In 2008, Ed took over the round dance teach for 10 couples and continued to do this for several years.

As Ed now taught both square and round dancing, it was felt our club name "Thames Valley Squares" was no longer fitting. For this reason, we changed our name to Thames Valley Dance Club. We thought this change may also encourage younger dancers to join us.

Through the years, we have performed dance demonstrations at nursing and retirement homes, schools, 4-H groups and other community groups. We have taken part in Ingersoll's Harvest Festival, a Hoedown in Thorndale, Norwich's Nostalgia Days, and Western Fair in London. We even had a spot to dance during an evening performance in Embro of the RCMP Musical Ride - to a crowd of 2000 people! We continue to do these dance demos whenever we are asked.

During Covid, we celebrated our 25th anniversary as a club.

Since returning to dance after Covid, we have welcomed close to 20 new members. We offer "bring a friend" nights, we dance at other clubs and invite their members to join us, we have theme nights, and we continue to have a Christmas dinner and summer picnic! And, we welcome you to join us on Monday nights at College Ave United Church in Woodstock where we dance from 7-9:30pm.
