SWOSDA Remember When...

Looking Back - 2023 - 11 - Dorothy Dahm - SWOSDA Historian

I was really disappointed not to be able to attend the district dance in September. I had been so looking forward to visiting with my dancing friends and celebrating the 25th anniversary of the Thames Valley Club. I found out later that I missed as well the presentation of a well-deserved Trillium Award to Fred and Dianne Joyner (actually delayed till January). I hope someone who was in attendance will share some of the photographs for placement in the scrapbooks. I had planned to bring out some items from the archives to share with you so will keep that in mind for the future dances this year.

Nearly every year a picture of the executive has been added to the archive albums. I have collected copies of those into a binder so that you can appreciate those who have given of their talents and energy for the membership. New members of the executive are asked to send me a thumbprint picture of yourself for this year's collage. This is still a work in progress but I am glad to share it with you at some of the district dances. I will share a copy of the collage with you when I get it finished. My goal is to have similar ones available for the specific jobs of the executive.

I have found in the Bugles at various times the beginnings of such works. For example, Carol Down, historian in 2009, SWOSDA's **Treasurers for the Past 50 Years**. Each entry included the time that they served as treasurer, and a short bio. I have been working this past month to update this but I need your help. If you could add to this information, it would be much appreciated. I plan on including a thumbprint or collage of these folks. While I may find some photos in my files, if you happen to have a file or pertinent information, I would appreciate some help from my friends. Just a reminder, my email address is familypatchwork.dd@gmail.com.

According to the albums, **Mr. Pat Flynn**, of Preston was elected as secretary – treasurer in 1959 and **Bill Little** as treasurer in 1960. According to Carol report **Oscar Blake**, from London, was from 1961, **Flo Blake** being added by 1962 and they continued on to 1965-66. **Walt and Eunice Warner** from London managed the financial records from 1966 to 1999. In 2009 Eunice was still dancing with Rhythm Rounds and was Club Treasurer. **Peter & Bev Piazza** maintained the SWOSDA finances from 1999 until 2001 They were very active as treasurers and problem solvers for Festival in 2008 and remained very active in dancing and executive positions at the Ontario Federation and Canadian Society. In 2023 he continues to work as treasurer for the Federation & Society. **John & Irene Bullock** were very active in the dance community and held many executive positions in SWOSDA starting a three-year term as treasurer for SWOSDA in 2000. **Ron & Sylvia Soeder were** treasurers of SWOSDA from 2003 to 2007. During that time SWOSDA became Square and Round Dancers of South Western Ontario Inc and Ron became a director of the Corporation.

After serving in a number of executive positions at club and at SWOSDA level **Bob & Eleanor Clarke** assumed the treasurer's position in 2007. They were members of the Black Light Dancers that performed in Montreal and Festival 2008. After Bob's death in 2017, **Gerry & Don Richardson** agreed to fill in temporarily. Their temporary stint stretched until 2021 when **Stephen Kilbridge** agreed to take over the position of treasurer.

We experienced such a great level of enjoyment in our years of dancing that we did a lot of travelling to meet new friends at various levels. Just to name a few, we made the trek to Manitoulin for Hawberry Hoedown, visited several of the camping groups e.g. at Forest or Port Glasgow or Waterloo. In our years on the SWOSDA executives we planned our visitations so that we were able to visit nearly all the over 50 clubs active at that time and tried to attend as many special dances as possible. As I scan the Bugles regularly, I discover places I would like to have been had I known about them. Duncan & Neva, it made me curious about the Jamboree in Southampton. What can you tell me about it?

To the rest of you, tell me about some of the special SWOSDA dances or weekends that you have attended past or present. I'll compile the information to share with you.

I was so glad to see there is another national convention in the works. I have in the archive collection quite a number of ID badges from various conventions. I am printing out the list of national conventions that we had in Canada. I think it would be really neat if I could create a chart which denoted with a marker how many people from SWOSDA. We might see which ones were most popular. Then we could make a display as a border showing pictures of some of the badges and their theme. Could you reply to me with a list of ones you have attended? You can imagine how elated I felt when I googled and found at listing of all the conventions which also had their theme included and how frustrated when I came back from answering the doorbell, the page had disappeared. Despite a bunch of attempts I have not been able to relocate it!

Inspiration / Motivation

Are you thinking you should do your part to help rebuild your club? Is there a part of you that knows deep down, that you should dig a little deeper and do your share to help? Does the thought excite you and stimulate your mind to thinking that "yes" I can do this.

Humm? Who do I know that would like to dance? Who do I know that would appreciate meeting new friends? Who do I know that would benefit from the health advantages our activity has to offer? Ok, so then, what is stopping me from reaching out to others? Am I assuming that they wouldn't be interested? Am I too shy to approach friends and neighbours to involve themselves in something you have found to be exciting, beneficial and healthy?Lots of questions.

To be inspired is to be stimulated. It pokes, digs, prods, and invigorates us into charting a course and executing the plan through to the end. Inspiration is energy and it goes hand in hand with creativity, and creativity generates new ideas and helps you discover ways to accomplish any tasks you set out to accomplish.

So, let's begin by creating a "vision" or a listing of those friends, co-workers and neighbours you believe may be interested in joining your club. Begin by carrying a notepad and jot down names as you hear or think of them. Be reasonable and realistic with your plan, making it within what you know are capable of. It has been proven that "word of mouth" is the most productive way to acquire new members to our activity so the probability of you being successful is very good.

The next step of your plan would be to find a date for a dance that your caller or club executive has set aside for new dancers. New dancers should not be charged admission for their first night and this should be cleared beforehand with your club.

Approaching those candidates, you have selected as possible new members, should be done face to face. Questions like "What are you guys doing Friday night?" or "Guess what we have been doing Friday evenings?" are a great approach. Be prepared to tell them all the benefits you have received from square dancing as they will probably ask lots of questions. Tell them you could pick them up and they could go with you is always a positive.

Teaming up with another club member has been found successful in recruiting new members. Sharing ideas and becoming motivated with that person inspires and excites the possibilities. If you need more ideas, remember the SWOSDA "Helping Clubs Grow" Committee is there to help you. I personally have found that if I get out of my comfort zone and break my routines of daily life, it encourages the flow of ideas which can provide insight into achieving success.

Stop doubting yourself and get on with what your mindset is telling you. Stay positive and excited about what you are going to accomplish. Be a leader. Employ your passion and perseverance to succeed with a "never give up" attitude. You got this.

You will encounter resistance. There will be nay-sayers, obstructions, roadblocks and trials and tribulations, but isn't that the fun and pleasure of success by overcoming these traits? Repute the mindset that your abilities are fixed and know that if we put in the effort, our skills and abilities can be pushed beyond the boundaries of your expectations producing amazing results.

Know that the power of positive thinking can lead to maximum results and something you can be proud of.

I am inspired by Elinor Smith who once said "It has long since come to my attention that people of accomplishment rarely sat back and let things happen to them. They went out and happened to things".

I know and feel that the best days for square and round dancing are ahead, and it excites me to think that we will be dancing far into the future with the numbers far exceeding those post Covid.

Feel the satisfaction and pride within yourself knowing you gave it everything you could in accomplishing what you set out as your goal.

- On seeing this signal, the caller or hall monitor will immediately respond and place an Emergency Call for Medical Aid if required.

Caller and Dancers should continue as usual while aid is administered.
